

## **Our High School and College Readiness Success**

A researcher from Duke University evaluated the impact of Student U on its students' academic and non-academic outcomes. Student U participation improved early high school success, particularly for students with below-median test scores. These positive outcomes are expected to shape students' path through high school and beyond.

## **Our College Readiness and Success**


### 55% College Graduation Rate

graduating high school seniors have enrolled in college, a post-secondary institution, or the military within their first year after high school.


